Craft Time

Here's a fun craft to do with your mom or dad.

Indian Corn Napkin Rings

WHAT YOU NEED:

- White or green construction paper
- Scissors
- Tissue paper: gold, rust, teal, brown
- Double-sided tape
- Pencil with an eraser



HOW TO MAKE THEM:

- Cut construction paper in strips about 1 1/2 inches (3.8 cm) wide by 5 (13 cm) inches long. Each strip will make one napkin ring.
- Cut the tissue paper into one-inch (2.5-cm) squares.
- Completely cover one side of the construction paper strip with double-sided tape.
- Twist a square of gold tissue paper around the pencil eraser and push down onto the tape.
 Remove pencil, leaving the tissue paper on the construction paper.
- Repeat step with tissue paper, alternating a rust, teal, and brown tissue paper for every two gold papers. (Other colors may be used.)
- Cover the entire strip of construction paper, securing the papers closely together, but leaving uncovered a half inch (1 cm) at the end to form the ring.
- Bend paper into a ring and glue (or staple) together.



In autumn, the leaves turn all different colors.
